From the Pastor's Study......

When you hear the word *poise*, what do you think? Someone once defined poise as raising one's eyebrows instead of the roof.

Actually, poise is hard to define. It has something to do with inner stability. I think it comes close to being defined in a tribute that a journalist gave to one of his colleagues when he said, "No matter what happens to him, he always comes out a little more like himself."

I like that. The capacity to face the seasons of our lives – the highs and the lows, the mountain tops and the valleys, and through it all, being able to come out a little more like ourselves.


I believe a Biblical passage that comes close to defining poise for me is Isaiah 30:15: "For thus said the Lord God, the Holy One of Israel, 'In returning and rest you shall be safe; in quietness and in trust shall be your strength.'" This is the image — in quietness and confidence will be your strength. Inner strength, emotional balance, and a quiet confidence — these are all spiritual qualities. These are all a part of what we call life's indispensable intangibles.

When I think of people in the Bible who have that quality of poise, my mind goes to Paul. His life was full of interruptions and detours and problems, but through it all he came out a little more like himself. In his second letter to the Corinthians, Paul wrote, "No wonder we do not lose heart. Though our humanity is in decay, yet day by day we are inwardly renewed. Meanwhile our eyes are fixed not on the things that are seen, but on the things that are unseen. Things that are seen are transient; the things that are unseen are eternal." I like the images created in this passage.


As the seasons of our life move on, our bodies go through changes and into decay. We can all relate to this in one way or another. Some of us develop tendonitis of the shoulder, or arthritis, or some other sign of bodily changes.

Through our faith there can be inward renewal during this whole process. Life's indispensable intangibles have a way of keeping us alive and vital, and these

are the qualities that bring poise and strength to our lives. "In quietness and confidence shall be your strength."

I believe it's during these moments that we need to take a step back and gain that larger view. Doing so, we'll realize there are more resources than we may have realized. What a difference per-spective makes! And this is what faith does. It gives us a larger view, a broader perspective.

There is another quality related to poise, and that is the capacity to let go, to release things.

Several years ago, there was a man named William Quayle who was Bishop of the United Methodist Church in the Kansas area. Bishop Quayle suffered from an ailment not uncommon among clergy. We call it the "Messiah Complex."

One night, as Bishop Quayle lay in bed, he felt the weight of his entire conference on his shoulders. His mind raced. He thought about the problems of some of the ministers and some of the churches. He tossed and turned for what seemed like hours. Finally, he could stand it no longer. "Something has to happen, Father!"

"All right, Quayle," he seemed to hear, "You go to sleep now. I'll sit up the rest of the night."

At times it is helpful to realize that the world can turn without us. At times we need to let go.

Over the years, I have become more and more convinced, through my own personal experience and the experiences of others, that there is nothing that can put steadiness into our steps and quietness into our souls more than the assurance that we are standing on solid ground, and standing thus, there is nothing that can defeat us.
